Withholding Tax Increased Nov. 1

Beginning with the first pay you receive in November, 1951, your Withholding Tax will be larger to conform with the new federal income tax law.

The new law requires that all employers deduct 20% from the wages of every employee, after making the allowance for dependents permitted by the law. This is an increase of 2% over the previous deduction.

In order to make the calculation of the tax deduction simpler, the government has prepared a table showing the exact amount to be deducted from an employee's wages, depending upon the amount of his wages and the number of his exemptions. This table is based on the "bracket" system, so that the amount deducted from any particular employee's pay may be slightly more or less than 20% of his taxable wages, depending upon just where his pay fits into the pay brackets.

On Page 3 of this issue is printed the table of withholding taxes which will apply in all cases where wages are paid weekly. We suggest you keep it to check your taxes each week.

Similar changes have been made in the tables which will be used for any employees who are paid at monthly intervals or otherwise.

Changes In Exemptions

In case the number of your withholding exemptions should be increased (such as by the birth of a child) or decreased (such as by the death of one of your dependents) please be sure to notify the Company immediately so that a proper adjustment of your tax can be made.

In support of this program, a group of employees representing all divisions of the Main Plant met to discuss the blood donor program within our plant. It is their feeling that all employees will cooperate whole-heartedly in our effort to meet the quota of 200 units of blood which has been assigned to Scovill employees for December 7th.

The Committee has adopted the following program:-

1) To solicit volunteers to meet our quota of 200 pints of blood to be donated on December 7.

This blood is to be designated for use by our armed forces primarily, any surplus will be designated for use in either of our two local hospitals for civilian use.

2) The Main Plant is to be divided into four sections, with each section to be responsible for the quota on any given visit of the mobile unit.

Dividing the plant into four sections would mean that no employee would be called upon more than once during the year, under normal conditions.

3) The mobile unit is to be set up at the Scovill Main Plant.

This would be at either Doolittle Alley Hall, the Foremen's Club, or the Girls' Club, whichever is most convenient to the most number of people on the given date.

4) Every effort will be made to eliminate a waiting period.

Donors are to be taken at the time indicated on their pledge cards. (Employee cooperation in keeping appointments is necessary to do this).

5) Complete information concerning the handling of the blood program is to be issued to employees so that it will be fully understood.

This will be done in the next issue of THE BULLETIN and followed up by individual notice to employees in the particular group concerned with the next visit of the mobile unit.

The American Red Cross is cooperating in the current Armed Forces Blood Donor program by making available its mobile units for collecting the blood, together with its well trained personnel to draw the blood.

72 Hours To Save A Soldier

Within 72 hours after you give a pint of blood, it may be in the battle zone of the Far East.

Blood is taken immediately to a West Coast laboratory where it is processed and then shipped direct to the Pacific Area. It is rushed by air to field hospitals and mobile surgical units near the front lines in Korea. Here it is transfused by medical corpsmen, within seconds or minutes, to a wounded American serviceman. You have saved a life.
