Watch Those V-Belts!

Far too many serious finger injuries happen around V-belts due to the carelessness of removing the guard when the power is still on.

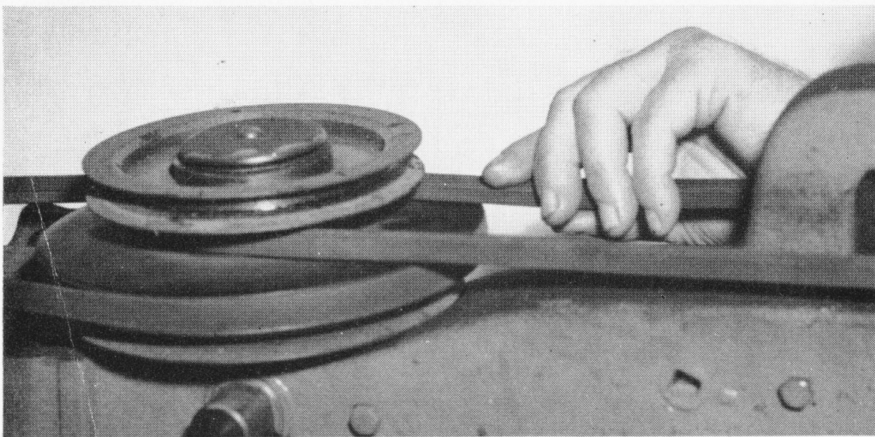
The three ways that fingers usually get clipped in a V-belt after the guard is removed are:

(1) The machine stalls, the power is still on and the operator gives the belt a tug with his fingers, thus they

get caught between belt and pulley.

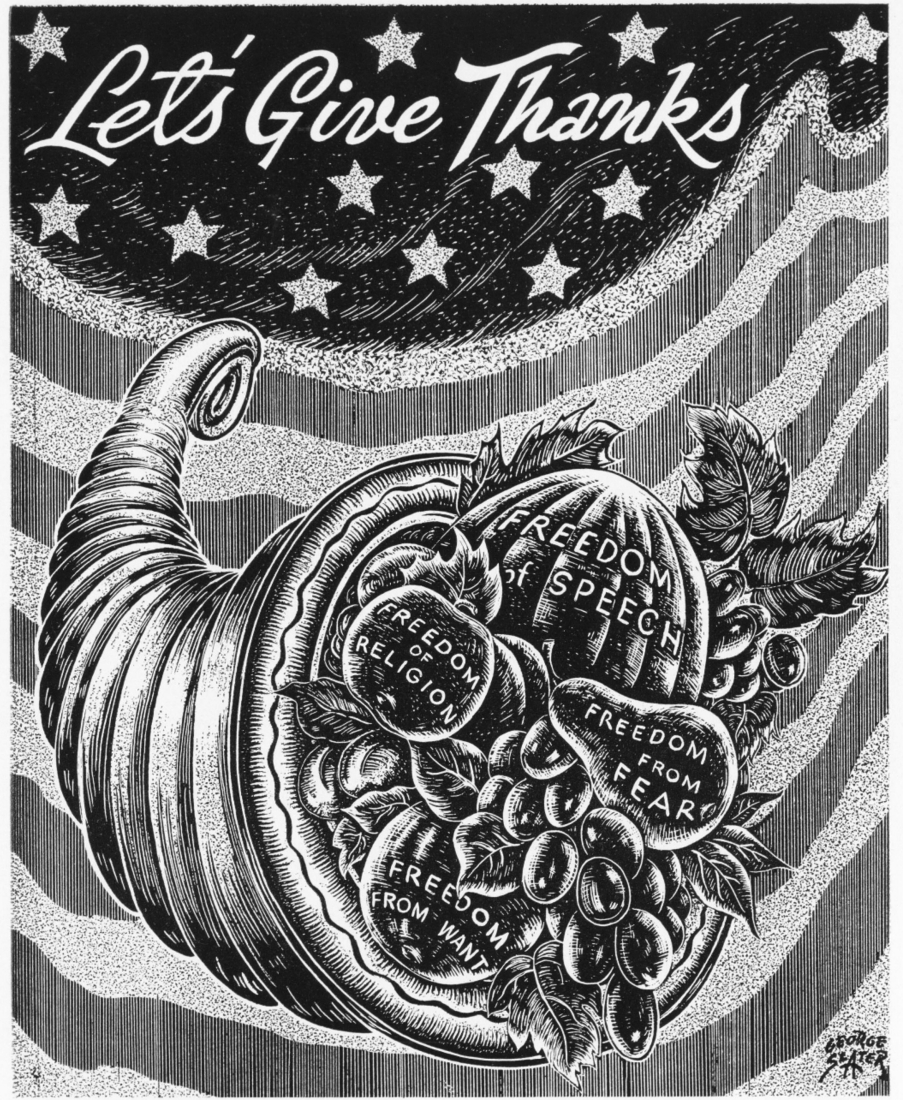
(2) The operator wants to know if the belt is tight so he taps it with his fingers while the power is on and that's it again.

(3) When working on the belt or pulley, he tells someone to put the power on and his fingers get caught because he did not get them out of the way in time.



To prevent serious finger injuries, keep away from V-belts until the power is off and be sure it stays off until fingers are in the clear.

Also, be sure the guard is put back on the belt when the job is done.



Your Medicine Cabinet

Keep close check on your medicine cabinet, because it is one of the most dangerous and yet the best aid in your home in case of sickness or accidents.

Read the following precautions approved by the leading medical and safety authorities:

1. Keep all bottles and containers plainly labeled.
2. Never take medicine in the dark.
3. Keep poisonous drugs separate from other medicines and *locked up*.
4. Keep all medicines, household cleaners and poisons out of reach of small children.
5. Teach older children safety rules in regard to medicines.
6. Before administering or taking any medicine, follow three rules:

- a. Read the label carefully *before* reaching for the bottle.
- b. Read the label again *before* measuring the prescribed dose.
- c. Check the label again *before* replacing the bottle on the shelf.

(Note: The pharmacists and druggists follow the above rules when they mix a doctor's prescription.)

7. Check the medicine cabinet *regularly*. Discard drugs no longer needed for the illness for which they were prescribed.

8. Throw out all unlabeled medicines.

9. Keep a "First Aid Instruction" card or booklet in the medicine cabinet. In case of emergency it is handy and read it frequently.

Thurs. Inter-Dept. League

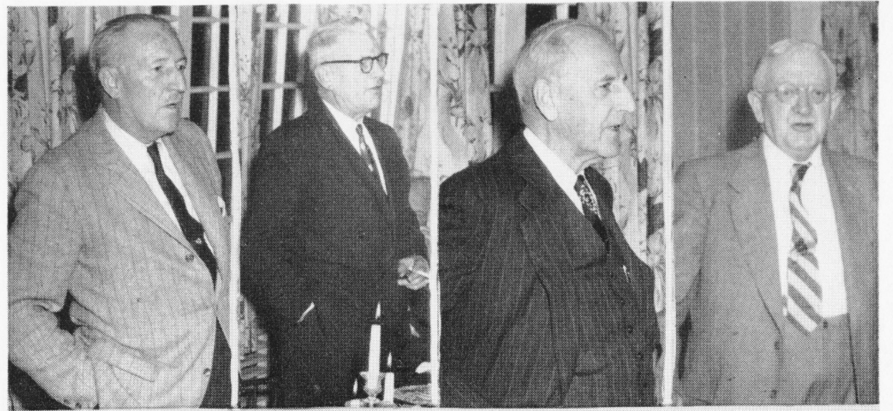

Mail Early For Christmas

It's time to start those Christmas mailing, Postmaster William J. Phelan warned today, launching his 1955 "Mail Early for Christmas" campaign.

"On the calendar it's a month away, but here in the Post Office it's Christmas today and every day until December 25th," he said. Extra mail carriers and office help have been secured, the delivery trucks serviced, Post Office inkwells filled and in fact everything is ready for the mammoth flood of Christmas mail that is expected to smash all records.

The Post Office has already dispatched a tremendous quantity of gift packages for members of the Armed Forces overseas. Christmas cards for service personnel can still be delivered in time if they are sent air mail before December 1st. In the U.S.A., smart people are now mailing gifts to friends and relatives living in other states.

"Actually, success in having all Christmas gifts and greeting cards delivered on time is largely a matter of advance planning and preparation which should be done this week", Postmaster Phelan points out.

He urges that you take the following steps at once: Get out your Christmas card list and carefully check through it. Make sure that each address includes the full name, street and number, city, zone and state. Then, pay a visit to the Post Office, stock up on stamps (use three-cent stamps on your Christmas cards for first class mail service) and ask any questions you may have about mailing regulations. You can do this in a leisurely way if you will come to the Post Office before 10:30 a.m. or between 1:30 and 3:30 p.m., thus missing the rush hours.

On your way home pick up a supply of heavy wrapping paper, sturdy empty cartons, strong cord and kraft paper adhesive tape. A modest investment in these necessities will pay big dividends in safe delivery of your cherished Christmas gifts.

After your gift wrapping and packing is completed, plan your mailings

so that those for the most distant points go first. Try to get all long-distance mailings into the Post Office before December 5th and those for nearby points should be mailed by December 10th. You'll be glad you did.
