Profit is necessary, as from profit come expansion of facilities and improved equipment. Also, from profit stockholders are paid for use of their money.

Repeated wage and salary increases increase costs and raise the breakeven point. That is the point where the volume of business shows neither profit nor loss. As the break-even point rises, it becomes imperative to reduce the amount of labor in a job. This is done by means of better methods and improved design. In many cases it means training employees in entirely different jobs. It may mean eliminating certain lines of business, and getting into others. It may mean moving plant to locations closer to customers.

We must all do what we can to make our jobs yield a profit. If we don't, the jobs will disappear.

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to a full circle of 80 ft. across. It will work on very low water pressure. This sprinkler is available without the base for underground systems. It has a coupling nut extension, washer storage cap, forged brass head and body, cast base with rust-proof runners, nylon-graphite bearing surfaces, 1/2" iron pipe thread on the head and a 3/4" swivel garden hose nut.

The Three-Arm sprinkler waters uniformly in a circle of 40 ft. across from three permanently set spray tips. It has a solid brass head and arms together with a cast base enameled white mounted on a rust-proof sled.


The Two-ARM ADJUSTABLE sprinkler waters circles of 10 ft. to 50 ft. or odd-shaped areas with fine or coarse spray. The balanced arms spin smoothly on silent nylon-graphite bearings which guarantees longer life. The heavy brass nozzles can be locked at any angle, set for any type spray and the arms can be made stationary or rotary by adjusting the sliding sleeve. The arms and nozzles are of solid brass. The base is cast with rust-proof runners and it also has a coupling nut extension and washer storage cap.

— Prevent Falls Join The Campaign

September 1st was the kick-off date for an intensive nationwide campaign to reduce accidental falls. The following statistics published by the National Safety Council and the U.S. Department of Labor, show why:-

- 1. Falls account for more accidental deaths than any other cause, with the exception of traffic accidents.
- 2. In industry, falls rank just after "handling objects" as the greatest source of disabling work injuries.
- 3. The cost and suffering from falls are substantially more than for other accidents.
- 4. Falls now account for more than half the injuries to office workers.

Falls are almost entirely preventable. Good housekeeping (clear aisles, clean floors, good lighting) will eliminate many of the causes of falls. Personal alertness for hazards (oil spots on floors, defective ladders, slippery footing, obstructions on floors) will save many persons from injury.



Safety Department records show that most of the falls in the plant are caused by such hazards as pictured here:— (1) hand trucks, (2) pieces of wood such as separators, (3) work containers, (4) oil spots and (5) work pieces.
