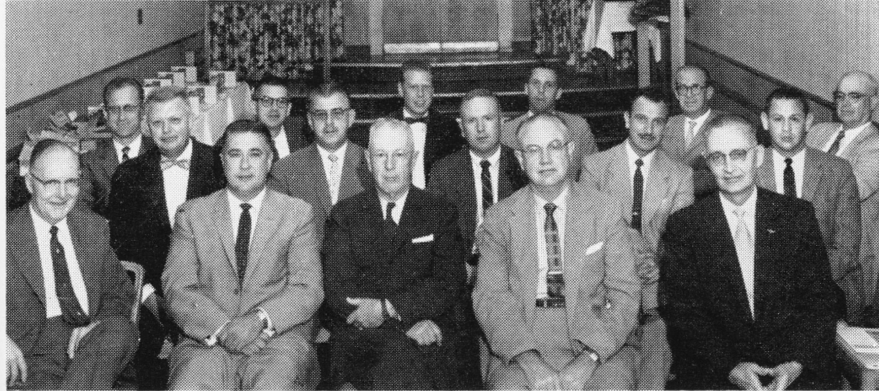

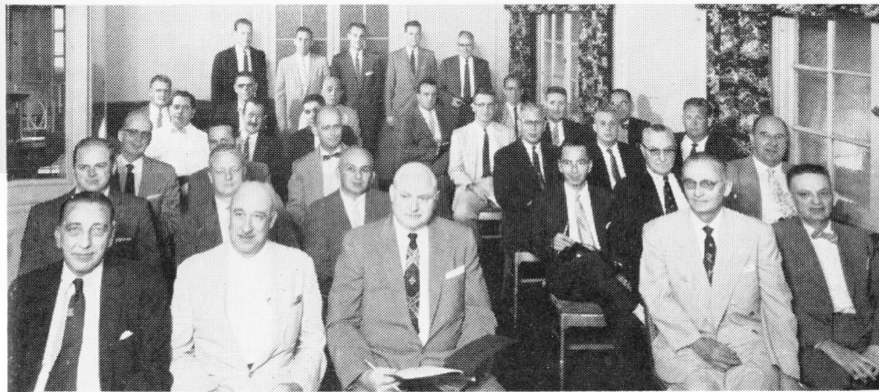

Hamilton Beach Men To Sell GREEN SPOT

Mr. H. W. Wild, Vice President and General Manager of our General Manufacturing Division, and Mr. A. O. Wolf, Vice President and General Manager of our Hamilton Beach Company Division, have announced that — effective August 15, 1957, our GREEN SPOT products will be sold by our Hamilton Beach salesmen rather than by manufacturer's representatives as in the past.

The only exception to this is in the Rocky Mountain States which will still be covered by a manufacturer's representative, and Canada where sales will be handled by R. C. Robinson.

According to Mr. S. M. Main, Division Sales Manager of the Merchandise Division and Mr. J. N. Hathaway, Assistant Sales Manager, the change will provide us with more complete and effective coverage at the wholesale and retail sales levels. "Results have already proved our move a wise one," said Mr. Hathaway. "The Hamilton Beach salesmen have taken on the line with great enthusiasm and are already bringing in new customers."

The changeover was coordinated with the GREEN SPOT sales meetings which were held in Denver, Colorado on August 16-17, and Louisville, Kentucky, on August 20-21. At these meetings the 1958 GREEN SPOT line and program was presented to the men.

As a part of the meetings, our GREEN SPOT sprinklers were demonstrated in action to the men. The Park Departments in both Denver and in Louisville were most cooperative in arranging these demonstrations.

Persons receiving yellow fever shots must wait two weeks after their last injection before donating.

The season when most people take vacations is past. With business at a low ebb during the summer, it has been the number of persons on vacation that has held down layoffs.

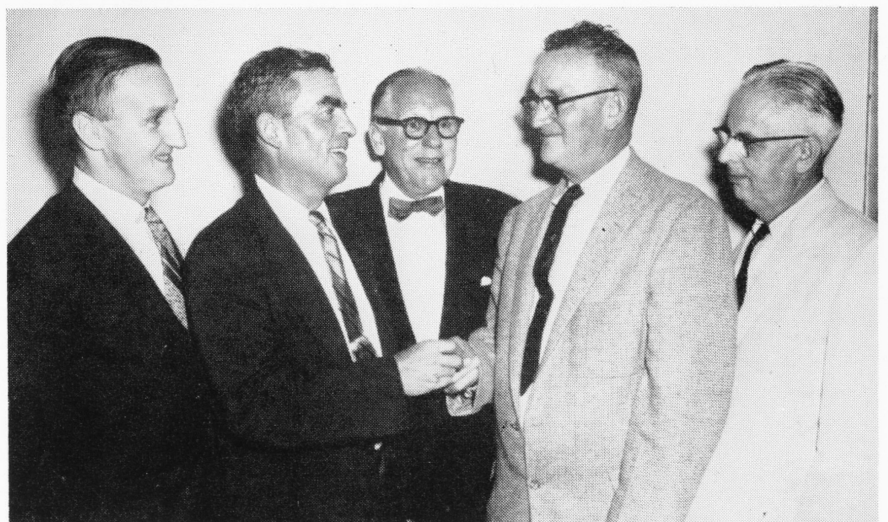
There does not appear to be any outstanding surge of new business in view. That is what we need.

University of Hartford

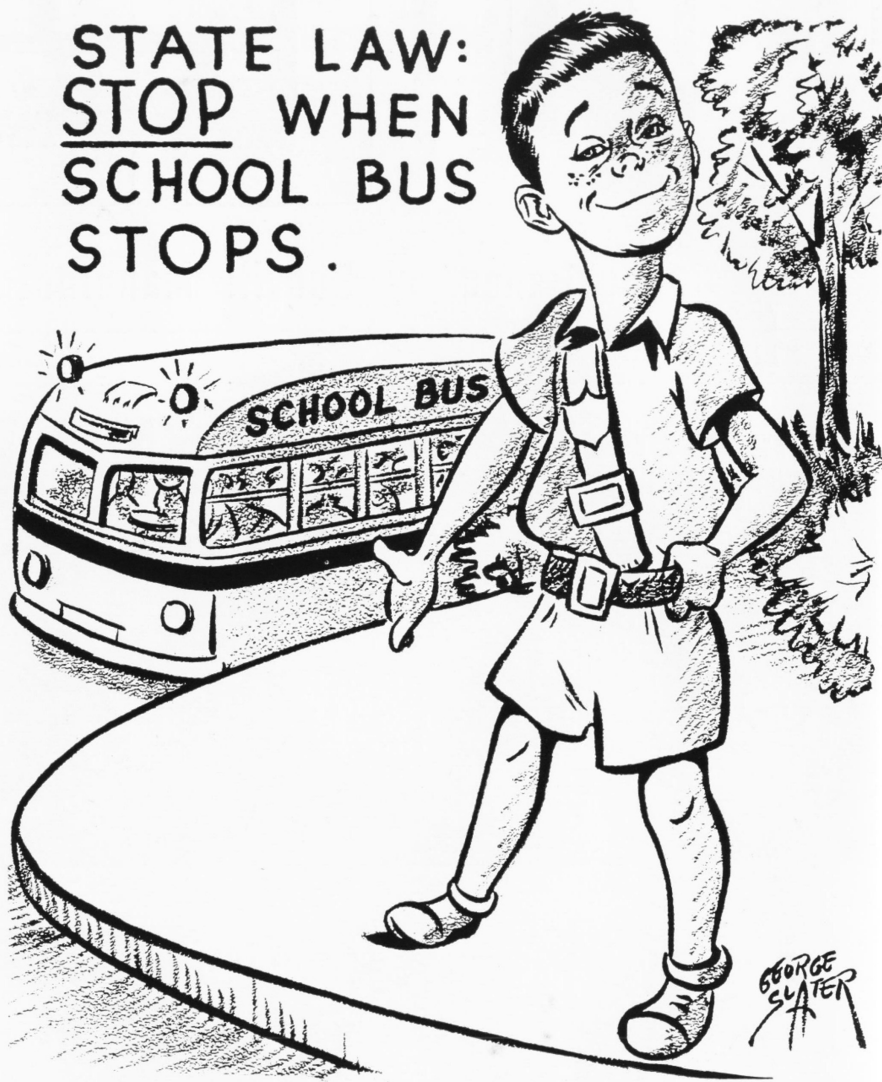
Courses are offered in Business Administration, Engineering, the Humanities, Social Sciences, Natural Sciences and Mathematics in Hillyer College.

STATE LAW: STOP WHEN SCHOOL BUS STOPS.



You Must Stop For School Bus

Summer is over and school is back in session. Children will be crossing streets and highways on their way to and from school and motorists must be extra careful.

In areas where school busses transport the children, motorists are cautioned to use extreme care. We all know the law states a motorist must stop when a school bus stops but many do not realize it means regardless of the direction you are traveling.

The law states:—

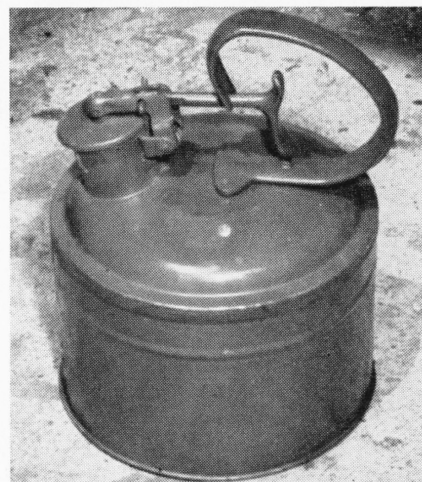
All traffic following or approaching a school bus must stop not less than ten feet from the school bus when school bus displays a semaphore type stop signal or flashing stop signal lights, except that oncoming traffic need not stop if operating on dual or divided highways.

Such traffic must remain standing until the school bus operator has removed the semaphore stop signal from view or extinguished the stop signal light.

Danger - Explosives!

Safety cans have special features. A fire baffle consisting of a perforated brass tube inside the spout prevents ignition of the contents from outside sources. A spring loaded cap prevents evaporation yet affords automatic venting. The large hole makes it easy to fill and empty. A bright red color warns users to be careful.

Remember, in the handling and use of flammable liquids, exposure of large liquid surfaces to air should be prevented. It is not the liquids themselves which burn or explode, but rather the vapor air mixture formed when they evaporate.



Gasoline is to be used only as an explosive fuel. Storage and handling of gasoline requires an approved-type safety can — never use a glass jug.

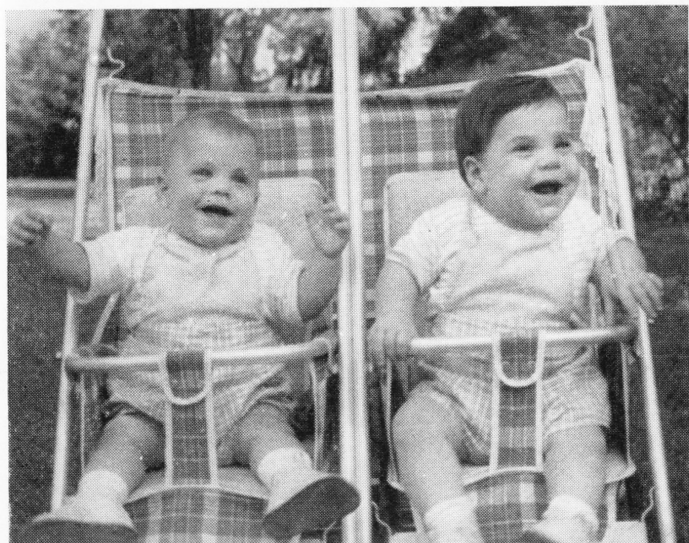

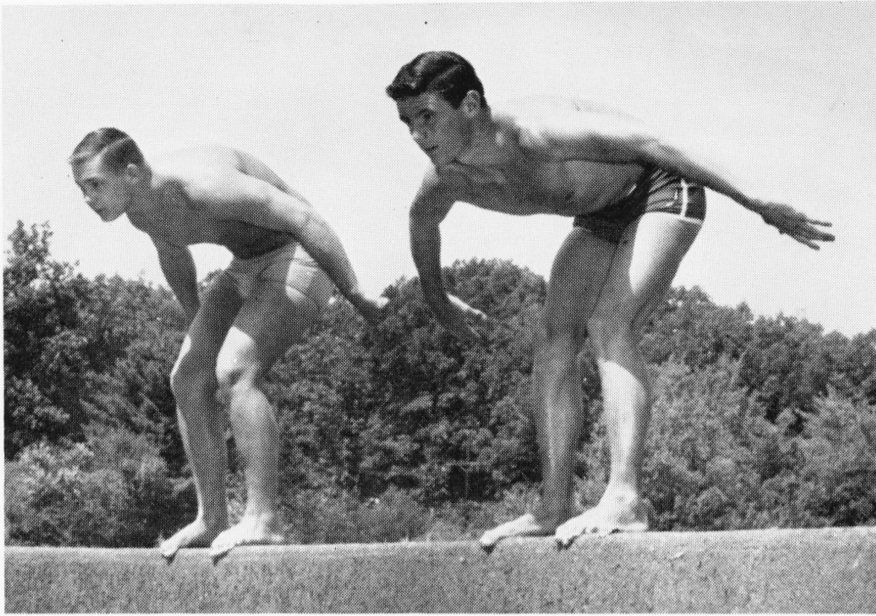

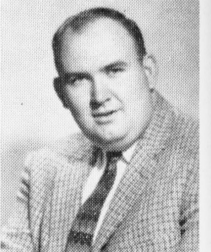
