

# Christmas Mailing Suggestions

In order to assure prompt handling and a smooth flow of the greatly expanded Christmas mails, Waterbury Postmaster John J. Slattery offers the following guide for your convenience.

MAIL EARLY—Distant out-of-town letters and packages (domestic) should be in the mail before December 10th. Mail for nearby points will arrive in time if mailed before December 15th.

For best service, use 1st class postage — the special 5¢ Christmas stamp is recommended. First class assures faster handling, permits greetings to be sealed and a personal message may be included. Also, your card will be forwarded if addressee has moved and returned to you if undeliverable.

Mail is handled faster in the post office if out-of-town is separated from local mail and all mail is faced with addresses one way and tied into bundles. Also, out-of-town and local labels are supplied by the post office on request.

Large bundles of greetings can be sent on their way faster if deposited directly in the main post office or one of the branches or stations operated by regular postal employees.

Careful packing of gift parcels is urged. Use plenty of cushioning material. Cartons, for greatest durability in handling, should be of strong double-faced corrugated fiberboard or solid fiberboard, particularly if going to distant points.

All addresses — both those of the addressee and the sender — should be legible and use of abbreviations should be avoided.

Do not mail money in Christmas gifts or greetings — use registered mail.

Very important — use your ZIP Code in return addresses and in all destination addresses, when known. This applies to packages as well as greeting cards.


