# MEMO from Management:

Scovill Today

How do you describe a company like Scovill—with over 18,000 people making hundreds of products sold in major markets throughout the world?

Our Annual Report for 1970 gives a birds-eye view of Scovill. It shows sales and profits for each of the six major

categories of our business.

This report shows that Scovill is a different company than it was in the early 1960's. Today, housing is our largest business. Such housing products as NuTone built-ins and and electronics, Caradco windows and doors, and Ajax builders; hardware accounted for 24 per cent of Scovill's sales in 1970. Five or six years ago, our housing products accounted for less than 3 per cent of Company sales.

Other major categories of our business are: Housewares Group — 15% of sales in 1970

Sewing Notions & Apparel Fasteners Group — 19.9% of sales in 1970

Metals Group — 20.4% of sales Industrial Products Group — 10.5% of sales Automotive Products Group — 10.4% of sales

As shown in the 1970 Annual Report, Scovill has come a long way in the past five years. New plants, new products and new markets give us the manufacturing and marketing strengths necessary for continuing growth in this new decade of the '70's.









### **Brass Strip Mill Expansion**

Our Mill Products expansion program, which will increase brass and copper alloy strip and sheet production capacity by approximately 33 percent, is proceding on schedule, according to Vice President and Division General Manager Wayne E. Johnson. The new facilities will be in full operation by July, 1972.

Mr. Johnson stated that the decision to expand our facilities for the production of brass and other copper alloy strip was essentially to provide additional capacity to serve growing markets for our products in such fields as housing, electrical and electronic applications, transportation, utensils and transformers and switch gears.

The project consists of an addition of 38,000 square feet to the Strip Mill and the installation of two major pieces of production equipment.

One is a new Sendzimir Cold Rolling Mill capable of producing large coils up to 500 pounds per inch of width. This new mill will have a revolutionary gauge control system which anticipates and corrects any gauge variation as the strip enters the rolls of the mill rather than simply recording the variance after the strip has been rolled. This will be a "first" in the brass industry and will enable us to hold very close tolerances for our customers.

The other major facility is a new Strip Annealer and Pickling line with a capacity of 15,000 pounds per hour which is 50% more than our present CAP line. It incorporates several advanced engineering features including a radiant tube type of furnace for annealing the metal which means a clean-

er surface because the products of combustion do not contact the strip. The new Strip Annealer not only improves quality but delivery as well since we will be able to anneal over 25,000 pounds per hour and with great flexibility to change over from one alloy to another with a minimum of delay.

Decision to make the major investment in our Strip Mill was an end product of a two-year planning effort which started over the concern for brass and its prospects five or ten years from now. Uppermost in mind when considering what equipment was wanted was the question "What facilities with what design features are available which will enable us to continue to provide the best possible quality and service to our customers?"

"From a subjective but detailed estimate of such factors as future user requirements, future competition and future product and process development," stated Planning Manager Dennis Maxwell, "we emerged with a 10-year plan for brass which not only enhances present capabilities but anticipates long-term future needs as well."

"The marketing outlook for brass and other copper alloys is bright because these alloys have a unique combination of characteristic which cannot be duplicated by substitute materials. These are such properties as corrosion resistance, electrical and thermo conductivity, fatigue resistance, springback, ease of applying a variety of finishes, and other properties which aluminum, steel and plastics do not fully possess."





#### For Cleaner Air — New Brass Chip Dryer

A "long step forward" in our \$6 million air and water pollution control program was taken with the recent installation and activation of a brass chip dryer in Bldg. 154, the new building adjacent to the Casting Shop.

A new system for eliminating smoke from the brass scrap melting process, the dryer removes smoke-producing oil from the scrap before it is melted in the casting operation. Scrap, in form of chips, is fed into the new system at 20,000 pounds per hour. After a crushing process, the chips enter a 40-foot long drying drum where the oil is reduced to vapor which then is completely burned off at a temperature of 1400°F. The dried chips are then ready for melting and casting into brass billets for processing into rod and wire.

The resulting control of the stack emissions is well within the new Connecticut regulations on clean air.


