Savings Bonds To Acquire New Look

The Department of the Treasury has announced that the Series E and Series H savings bonds have been redesigned. The redesign relates only to format and appearance and does not in any way affect the terms of any bonds of these series that are outstanding or currently on sale.

There is still an ample supply of bonds of the earlier design on hand, and they will be used before the "1972 design" bonds are distributed. As "E" bond stocks of individual assembly types and denominations are depleted, the new 1972 design bonds will be issued. This will be done automatically, with no special announcement at the time.

1972 Bond Drive

Employees will have an opportunity to sign up for the purchase of savings bonds through payroll deductions, or to increase their present deductions, during the annual drive which, this year, will be held beginning with the week of May 15th.

Scovill Releases Annual Report

The report of 1971 operations dramatically shows Scovill's transformation to mainly a consumer products company after having been best known as a manufacturer of industrial and brass mill products.

Chairman Malcolm Baldrige and president John C. Helies state, "Scovill has for nearly a decade been a company in transition, becoming a strong marketing organization after long concentration on engineering and manufacturing skills."

Analysis of the report shows that the housing products group increased its leadership as the Company's largest business, producing 30 per cent of overall sales and 43 per cent of the \$28,635,000 of last year's pretax profits.

They also noted the relative importance of the Company's other consumer products businesses: sewing notions and apparel fasteners, over 20

1972 Vacations

The Waterbury Divisions and Services will close for vacation starting Monday, July 3rd and will reopen with the start of the first shift on Monday, July 17th, 1972.

Exceptions to the above will be by notification in departments or to individual employees.

Employees entitled to more than two weeks of vacation and those required to work during the shutdown will be canvassed for their choice of time off. Such time off cannot seriously interfere with production or plant operations and must be taken in full calendar weeks. Hourly and piecework employees must take all vacation to which they are entitled.

In order that vacation pays can be prepared in advance of an employee's vacation, Central Accounting must have three weeks' notice prior to the start of vacation.

Employees who qualify will receive holiday pay for July 4th.

Annual Report Time

This is the time of year for companies across the land to issue formal reports on their performance for the previous year. With thousands of reports flooding the mails, it is difficult for any one report to attract readership.

The answer? Make your report distinctive enough to attract attention — and easy to read and understand.

Our report for 1971 which is being distributed now is, to say the least, different. We believe that it is the first one to have a pop-up in its centerfold—a three-dimensional presentation of our principal consumer products. The cover shows a fictitious shopping center whose stores feature our wide diversity of consumer products.

There is more to an annual report than attractive graphics, however. It's the financial results that pay the bills and meet the payrolls. 1971 was a year of improvement for Scovill, with total sales up 6% and per share earnings up 15% over 1970.

The report summarizes the financial results for the Company as a whole and also shows the sales and pre-tax earnings for each of our six major product groups for the past five years. These latter figures show the important changes that have taken place in this period — changes that have increased our diversity to the point where consumer related products accounted for 74% of 1971 sales. This strength and diversity in major market areas is the theme of our 1971 Annual Report.

"Hire A Vet" Week

In a proclamation issued by Mayor Victor Mambruno, in conjunction with the National Alliance of Businessmen, one week in March was designated as "Hire A Veteran" week. A special 'telephone blitz' was set up in the old Planning Office at Scovill and volunteer retired employees came in to call area businessmen for pledges.

NAB is a private, non-profit corporation formed at the request of the President of the United States. The continuing goal of the JOBS program (Job Opportunities in the Business Sector) is permanent employment for disadvantaged Americans and Vietnam-era veterans, and summer jobs for school-age youths.

A statement received from Governor Meskill reads, in part:—

"There are more than 11,300 Vietnam Era veterans in Connecticut who are out of work. There are also many disadvantaged Connecticut residents seeking jobs so they can break the cycle of poverty.

"I am very pleased that the NAB has heeded the President's plea for a special effort to meet these problems of unemployment.

"In Waterbury from March 6 to 10, the NAB will be conducting an extensive telephone campaign to express its gratitude to these loyal veterans who served their country so well in a difficult and unpopular war and also in an effort to help the disadvantaged.

"The telephone campaign will mean hundreds of businessmen will be called and urged to provide job opportunities for the veterans and for the disadvantaged.

"I join the NAB in asking our Connecticut employers to do their utmost to help combat these problems.

"A special commendation is also due Scovill Manufacturing Company which is providing space and the personnel for the ten-phone operation that will be the heart of the effort. I wish the campaign every success."







per cent of sales and more than 21 per cent of earnings; automotive products, 11 per cent and 16 per cent; and housewares, over 12 per cent and almost 6 per cent.

The Metals Group, affected adversely by depression conditions in its industry, had nearly 17 per cent of over-all sales and about 9 per cent of earnings. Industrial products, including defense business which is now down to about 2 per cent of all sales, had more than 9 per cent of sales and over 4 per cent of earnings.
