Scovill Employees "Take Stock in America"

A U.S. Treasury Dept. Citation was awarded to Scovill recently in recognition of employee participation in the U.S. Savings Bonds program. Scovill president John Helies accepted the citation from U.S. Savings Bonds Division Area Manager Charles Goodall. Scovill Local 1604 UAW vice president Edward Borowski represented the Union at the presentation.

S. S. Tax Increase

In the last six months, two sweeping changes have been made in the Social Security law regarding Old Age, Survivors and Disability Insurance (OSADI).

First, legislation enacted in July raised Social Security benefits 20 percent across-the-board beginning in October, and also raised taxes.

Second, legislation passed in October broadened the basis of eligibility for widows, the disabled, and low wage earners, and raised the tax rates above those passed in July.

The financing of the new benefits will require an increase both in the percent paid by the employers and the employees and in the taxable wage base for Social Security contributions from wages and salaries.

The new tax rate, effective January 1, 1973, will be 5.85% for both employer and employee.

The expanded wage base to which the tax will be applied is \$10,800. for 1973, and will increase to \$12,000 by 1974. Before these 1972 amendments, the wage base was to be held to a \$9,000 maximum.

The 1972 campaign saw 67% of Waterbury Division employees buying U.S. Savings Bonds through the Payroll Deduction Plan, compared to 58% in 1971; company-wide participation is 44% in 1972, it was 38% in 1971.

After 1974, the new law provides that the wage base automatically will be adjusted upward as wage levels rise. There is also a provision in the new law to raise benefits automatically whenever the consumer price index goes up.

The law reduces the relative tax burden on low income earners because a larger portion of previously exempt higher incomes—those in excess of \$9,000—will be subject to the new tax rate.

Federal Unemployment Insurance

Effective January 1, 1973, the Federal Unemployment Insurance rate will be increased from .5% to .58% of the first \$4,200 earned by each individual during the year.

This is an increase of \$3.36 per person over the present rate—and is paid by the employer.

Hamilton Beach On TV

Over 400 million viewer impressions, in 53 million households throughout the country, will see Hamilton Beach products advertised on the three networks, ABC, CBS and NBC, between November 15th through December 17th.

Using prime time top rated family shows such as All in the Family, the Don Rickles Special and both MFG and college football games, major exposure will be given to the new line of Clean Steam irons, extolling incomparable wanted features such as Fabriscope, Burst of Steam, 65 steam vents, lightness of weight and use of plain tap water. Emphasis will also be on the exclusive Baconer in the new network TV schedule.

Pre-Retirement Course May Go State-Wide

All industrial centers in the state may soon be offering pre-retirement planning courses patterned after our Scovill program.

Charles Rietdyke, who conducted the courses at Scovill, is chairman of the new state committee which will set up the state's program. He and Dr. Robert Litro, director of the business division of Mattatuck College, have been working on a similar program for the College next spring. If successful at the school, the program will go state-wide, through the State Department of Aging.


Christmas Shutdown

This will insure the return of the card if undeliverable.

For civilians in Europe, deadlines for parcels by surface was November 11; by air mail, it is December 11th. Greeting cards should have been in the mails by November 17th, but can still go by air mail until Dec. 16th.

Postmaster Edward J. Sheehan wishes to stress an area of concern with the number of short paid greeting cards being mailed each year to foreign countries and which have to be returned for additional postage as all foreign mail must be fully prepaid before embarkation.

Your Social Security


People tend to underestimate the monthly benefits social security can pay. According to a recent survey, only one person in 25 gave the correct answer to this question:

"Let's take a man 35 years old, with a wife and two young children and average earnings of about \$500 a month. If he became disabled and couldn't work any more, how much do you think he and his family would get from social security? Or, if he died, how much do you think his wife and children would get? (Just a rough guess)"

The question was put to a sampling of people 18 and over across the nation. The correct answer is about \$500 a month, according to Mr. Ernest D. Bauer, social security district manager in Waterbury.

"But three out of four people guessed the social security payments would be \$350 a month or less," he said. "More than half guessed \$250 or less. One out of four guessed \$150 or less."

Social security pays monthly disability benefits to eligible workers and their families if the worker is severely disabled and cannot work for a year or more. Survivors benefits are payable to certain family members if the worker dies. A worker's benefit amount is based on his average earnings covered by social security over a period of years.

"If a 35-year-old worker becomes disabled in 1972", Mr. Bauer said, "he and his family could be eligible for disability payments if he had worked in jobs covered by social security for five out of the ten years before he became disabled."

If the worker died, Mr. Bauer said, his wife and children could start getting payments from social security if he had worked 1-1/2 years during the three years before he died in work covered by social security.

"A woman who works is building similar protection for herself and her family," he said.






